**VINTAGE WEDDING GOWN DISPLAY AT MUSEUM
OPENS JUNE 22 WITH RECEPTION**

Ashwaubenon Historical Society Museum volunteers are busy preparing a vintage wedding gown display. It will open with a reception on Saturday, June 22, 1:00-4:00 p.m. Gowns displayed will date back to the early 1900's and were worn by those married in Ashwaubenon or those who live here now. A featured item will be part of the wedding costume of Theresa Rankin, granddaughter of Chief Ashwaubomay. It is on loan from the Neville Public Museum which owns the entire costume. The show will run through December. Some of the gowns in the display include those worn by:

COMMUNITY CONSOLIDATION--NOT A NEW IDEA

In his state of the city address on March 20, 2013, Green Bay Mayor Jim Schmitt proposed the creation of a Greater Green Bay Metropolitan area by 2025. It would merge Green Bay and surrounding communities, including Ashwaubenon, into one governmental unit.

a consolidation with De Pere and Allouez may be to Ashwaubenon an advantage over a period of years due to changing legislation on the state level. Said committee to elect its own chairman. Progress reports to be made to the Town Board. Motion carried unanimously."

This is not the first time Ashwaubenon has been part of a merger proposal. In 1960, Ashwaubenon Township Chairman Leo Bordeleau proposed the incorporation of the City of De Pere and the townships of Ashwaubenon and Allouez. One reason for the suggestion was that, under state law, Ashwaubenon and Allouez had to join a high school district by September 1962. Bordeleau suggested that, under a merger, Ashwaubenon and Allouez each build a junior high school, with the De Pere high schools serving as the high schools for the merged community. He also stated the importance of a bridge linking Allouez and Ashwaubenon, lining up with the airport.

In May 1960, the De Pere City Council earmarked up to \$2,000 for a professional study of consolidation on the condition that the townships of Allouez and Ashwaubenon do the same. A GREEN BAY PRESS GAZETTE article on May 19, 1960, describes opposition by Allouez citizens. A search of the Ashwaubenon Township Board minutes 1960-61 found no further action. Ashwaubenon Plan Commission minutes are incomplete, missing the years 1951-1963.

Bordeleau's proposal resulted in this action by the Ashwaubenon Town Board on April 13, 1960: *"Motion by (Frank) Larson, seconded by (Alfred) Klipstine to appoint all members of the Plan Board and all members of the Special High School Study Committee to a special committee to study Chairman Bordeleau suggestion that*

Mary Selner grew up on a farm in East Green Bay. Her husband, Don, grew up in the Coleman, WI area where they lived for a time after they were married.

Don moved to an historic home on South Broadway in Ashwaubenon. It is a Sears home and was formerly the Constance Lemerond home, a boarding house for Cormier School teachers and sugar beet factory workers. For a time, Mary and Don offered tours of their home, which has many antiques that they have collected. Mary has been co-chair of the Ashwaubenon Historical Society Plant Sale for many years and has set up many of the Museum's exhibits. Don has helped with the exhibits and with whatever needs to be done. He also takes many of the photos of Museum activities. Both have been members of the Historical Society since 1999.

They moved to a home on Broadway in Ashwaubenon in 1965. Mary said she learned the history of the Broadway area from the stories told by neighbors while sitting on the porch of the Bosar house in the evenings. In 1990, Mary and

ITEMS DONATED TO THE MUSEUM

The Ashwaubenon School District donated a ledger titled "Treasurer of School District No. One, Town of Ashwaubenon." It lists school district expenses from 1872 to 1922.



Carol Selissen donated paintings of Rasmus Olsen and Kari Pedersdatter, the parents of Gurina Rasmussen, wife of Johan Eliason. The Eliason farm is part of the Ashwaubenon Historical Society Museum's "Our Agricultural Roots" farm family exhibit, which includes photos and narrative.

Carol Selissen, a descendent of the Eliason family, said that the paintings were carried over the mountains from Sweden to Norway during an upheaval in Norway in the 1800's. Gurina and Johan immigrated to Wisconsin in 1868 and moved to Ashwaubenon in 1869 after spending their first winter in Winneconne. Gurina died in 1901 and Johan in 1916. The farm was passed on their son, Hans. There have been descendents of Johan and Gurina living on part of the Eliason farm for six generations.

CHIEF ASHWAUBOMAY GRAVE MARKER SIGN REFURBISHED

The Ashwaubenon Historical Society has refurbished the brass sign attached to Chief Ashwaubomay's grave marker stone in Ashwaubomay Park. The sign was loose and was removed for the refurbishing. The sign is currently on display at the Ashwaubenon Historical Society Museum. It will remain there until improvements

at the grave site are completed by the Ashwaubenon Park and Recreation Department. Its goal is to make the site more visible and accessible to the public. Ashwaubenon gets its name from Chief Ashwaubomay. The approximate site of his grave was marked and dedicated in 1976 when the park opened.
